20/20 ABC Tracy Thurman vs. Torrington Police

20 minutes

Tom Jerrell reports on the horrific case of the abused wife Tracy Thurman and her struggle against her husband without adequate assistance from the Torrington, CT police. Tracy Thurman sued Torrington city police for negligence and failure to provide protection under the law.

48 Hours: Domestic Violence, Mandatory Arrest

54 minutes

This is a taped 48 Hours show about various aspects of domestic violence and mandatory arrest (not edited for commercials.)

A Better Way: Emotional Child Abuse Prevention

28 minutes

This video uses a series of vignettes, which are interwoven with and analyzed by a discussion group made up of real parents. It explores ways to improve parent-child relationships and demonstrates that even the most frustrating parenting situations have solutions other than abuse.

A Family Secret

11 minutes

This video examines the growing problem of older adults as victims of both physical and psychological neglect and abuse. This video shows the relations within a caregiver's family. It also examines how outside support alleviates some of this stress in caring for elders.

A Family Violence Prevention Fund, PSA's

4 minutes

This is a series of public service announcements about domestic violence.

A Safer Place: Coping with Elder Abuse & Neglect in Illinois

25 minutes

From the Department on Aging, this video deals with elder abuse and neglect in the State of Illinois.

A Teacher Saved My Life

25 minutes

With host Oprah Winfrey, teachers and education professionals discuss the process teachers should go through if they suspect that one of their students is abused. They discuss different signs to look for when child abuse is suspected as well as the consequences that take place after reporting child abuse.

Abortion Denied

60 minutes, 1990

The death of Becky Bell (Indianapolis, Indiana) from complications of an illegal abortion is the starting point for a discussion on the effects of parental consent and notification laws on young women trying to obtain abortions.

About Love

55 minutes, 1992

This video portrays the life of a young Asian American woman as she struggles to break away from an abusive marriage. She goes to a shelter, asks for legal advice, and deals with the consequences of leaving a marriage full of abuse and financial difficulties. This video would benefit women who are being abused, especially those dealing with cultural issues. (English, Korean, Chinese and Japanese.)

Abusive Relationships

17 minutes, 1996

Nineteen-year-old Lynn Kenney is one of a growing number of women abused by their boyfriends. Through Lynn's story viewers will learn what it means to be abused in a relationship. Whether the abuse is physical or verbal, the effects can be serious. Teenagers will also learn some of the warning signs of potential abuse and where they can go for help.

Agents of Change

20 minutes

The Victims Services Agency prepared this video for a series of national workshops on the criminal justice system's response to domestic violence law enforcement policies. It examines the domestic violence policies of the cities of Rye, New York and Newport News, Virginia, - very different in demographics, but both with newly instituted strict arrest policies for cases of domestic violence. Excellent for law enforcement audiences who have input into policy development and/or for the State's Attorneys who are interested in the local policies.

Albuquerque Journal

24 minutes, 1989

From Victim Service Agency (Agents of Change), this film chronicles a Tennessee police officer's visit to Albuquerque. It includes footage of their police calls, sessions with formerly battered women, and an abuser treatment session.

Always Home: Community Crisis Center

(Elgin) (24 minutes)

Approaches to Teaching Sexuality

Part I 1 Hour 14 Minutes

Part II 48 Minutes

Dr. Betsy Bergen speaks to teachers, social workers, parents, adoptive and foster parents, and other childcare professionals about children and sexuality. She presents an analysis of current issues in sexuality such as birth control and pregnancy. Bergen also examines how to answer the questions teens ask about puberty, sexuality, relationships, and how to communicate these messages to teens.

Approaching Potentially Explosive Conflicts

22 minutes

This video replays after each careless approach and entry of law enforcement to show how the use of more caution could have prevented the injuries and fatalities shown. It can be used to stimulate discussion about the effectiveness of the approach and entry techniques as they can be used in situations.

Battered Wives

45 minutes

This is a fictional movie about two families experiencing domestic violence. In the video, one woman experiences abuse for the first time and the other is married to an ongoing abuser. This video would be good for the general audience of high school age or older.

Battered Women Who Abuse Alcohol

This is a taped conference from 1990.

Batterers Will Kill

24 minutes

Through the stories of three families devastated by homicide, this program highlights the warning signs and abuse that can escalate to murder.

Believe Me

21 minutes

In this video, Todd remembers a time in his childhood when being believed was an important issue. Although he sometimes makes up tall tales, most of the time he tells the truth. It becomes very important to tell the truth when his grandfather starts playing secret touching games with him. At first no one believes him, but Todd keeps telling people until someone believes him.

Birthright

13 minutes, 1985

Child support enforcement docu-drama

Black Eyed Susan

47 minutes, 1994

This video is a story of how a young boy acts out in school and in home, because of the domestic violence that is happening in his home. Eventually, he confides to his teacher about the family violence and then life changes for him, his mom, and his sister when they move to a women's shelter. This video allows a child to see that sometimes these changes are necessary for things to get better.

Black Is...Black Ain't

86 minutes

This film covers various aspects of African American identity.

Boys Will Be . . .

Break the Silence: Kids Against Child Abuse

30 minutes

This video explains physical abuse, sexual abuse, and neglect in a way young children can understand. Four kids talk candidly about their abuse as they describe how adults use fear, manipulation, and neglect to hurt children. As each story is told, animated versions of the child and the abuser help illustrate how the abuse happened and how it made the child feel. Each story has a happy ending. Hosted by Jane Seymour, this film sends the strong message to children to tell an adult if they are being abused.

Breaking the Cycle

9 minutes, 1995

The Coors Brewing Co. produced this video as a motivational and informational piece on literacy in the U.S. It works as a motivational piece by telling stories and showing the impact that adult education/job training programs can have on women and their families. It is an informational piece by offering facts about women's educational programs, nontraditional employment for women and advice from the three women and their employers about success.

Breaking the Cycle of Violence

20 minutes, 1996

This video is designed to help service professionals do their job more effectively by recognizing, reporting, investigating, and treating their interrelated forms of family violence. This program explores the links between child abuse, animal abuse, and other forms of domestic violence. Guidelines are provided for how to handle suspicious circumstances that these professionals may encounter.

Breaking the Silence

12 minutes

Produced by the Illinois Coalition Against Domestic Violence, this video provides a general overview of domestic violence and the resources available to help battered women. It follows a middle-class battered woman through her interactions with a shelter, a hospital, the police, and shows her obtaining an Order of Protection.

Broken Promises

30 minutes

Produced by BIHA (Black, Indian, Hispanic, Asian) Women in Action, each of these four videos highlights women of a different culture and discusses their experiences of abuse. (Available with Black, Native American or Latino participants.)

Broken Vows: Religious Perspectives on Domestic Violence (also in Spanish)

(Part 1– 37 minutes; Part 2 – 22 minutes; 1994).

Produced by the Center for the Prevention of Sexual & Domestic Violence. Also includes facilitator's guide.

--Intended for clergy, congregations, religious educators, and staff of shelters and human service agencies. Topics include: understanding the dynamics of domestic violence; support of victims through religious and secular communities; and developing programs for the prevention of domestic violence. Presents a diversity of religious traditions. Examines viewpoints of victims, shelter staff, clergy, and psychologists. Intended for group discussion.

Building Boards That Work

1996

Video on non-profit organizational issues.

Bully on the Bus

15 minutes, 1993

This video shows Bridget-the-Bully picking on Katie. A misunderstanding results in Katie being labeled a nerd and off limits to Bridget's friends. Katie struggles with sadness and conflicting feelings about her one-time friend. She gets advice on what to do from her teacher and her friend. This helps Katie see that she is an important person and that a lot of kids would like to be her friends. With this new information, Katie is able to confront Bridget and solve problems.

C.A.V.E. Alternative School Program

(2001)

Child Abuse: A Global Crisis

28 minutes, 1989

This video gives a general discussion of child abuse as not just a national problem, but also as a worldwide problem.

Child Abuse: Family Matters

20 minutes, 1996

Through the heartfelt comments of abused kids and a family recovering from an abusive situation, viewers are shown the personal side of today's grim headlines. Family members discuss the effect abuse had on their lives and how they stopped the cycle of abuse. A family therapist explains the different types of child abuse and demonstrates intervention methods that can be used by friends and families.

Child Abuse: It Shouldn't Hurt To Be A Kid

27 minutes

This video is for any professional mandated by law to report suspected child abuse, or anyone who comes in contact with children. This program defines child abuse and teaches how to recognize it. It explains how to report suspected child abuse and what will happen after the report is made. It also indicates the civil and criminal penalties for failure to report suspected cases.

Child Sexual Abuse: The Clinical Interview

60 minutes, 1986

This how-to film dramatizing interviews with child victims of sexual abuse shows techniques to use and things to look for while interviewing a child

Childhood Sexual Abuse: Four Case Studies.

50 minutes

This video serves to educate people about the varieties of child sexual abuse and about the negative consequences of these experiences on the personalities of and later lives of victims. This is all shown in the interviews of four women who were victims of child sexual abuse. They expose deeply rooted problems they have as a result of the abuse.

Dr. Betsy Bergen speaks to teachers, parents, adoptive and foster parents, juvenile workers and other childcare professionals about the ways children

learn about sex. She discusses the stages of sexual development and what children want to know about sexuality; she also addresses some approaches to teaching facts of sexuality to children and adolescents.

Children Dealing With Cultural Differences

Children of Divorce

18 minutes, 1996

This video explores the divorce process from the children's point of view- what they're thinking and feeling, and ways they try to cope with the situation. A divorce counselor discusses the grieving process following divorce and strongly encourages children to talk out their emotions so that they can come to accept the situation and get on with their lives.

Children's Conference

Jan Russell and Theresa Ceko, Child Abduction, Custody.

Clinical Aspects of Domestic Violence for the Obstetrician/Gynecologist

22 minutes, 1993

This film designed for obstetricians and gynecologists to educate them about the clinical aspects of domestic violence. It gives them facts on domestic violence and pregnancy, how to talk to their patients about domestic violence and stresses the importance of routine screening.

Cocaine Abuse: The End of the Line (also in Spanish)

25 minutes, 1984

Cocaine, a highly dangerous drug, damages personalities, destroys careers and relationships, causes addiction, paranoia, fear, guilt and anger. This video hosted by Richard Dryfuss, examines the facts of these harmful effects through testimonies of former addicts.

Cocainomania: El Punto Final

Cocaina, una droga muy peligrosa, perjudica la personalidad, destruye las carreras y las relaciones, causa aflicción, y hace la paranoia, el temor, y la vergüenza. Este video, narrado por Richard Dreyfuss, interroga los hechos de los efectos malos por los testimonios de personas adictas reformadas.

Come Planet Earth

26 minutes, 1990

This video expresses environmental awareness through music.

Community Policing: Violence in the Workplace

15 minutes, 1996

This video shows officers how to alert businesses and their employees to available safety precautions, including proactive approaches to providing training and information on violence encounters.

Conflict Resolution: Mediating Disputes

22 minutes

This program presents two dispute situations that focus on mediation as a method of solution. Working out a negotiated settlement through mediation has many advantages for the officer. Properly applied, the process minimizes callbacks, thus reducing the opportunity for dispute-related injuries.

Conflict Resolution: Utilizing Community Resources

21 minutes

Crime in the Dark

CBS "48 Hours" broadcast

Crimes Against Women

48 minutes

Psychologists, police, investigators and other crime experts utilize real life experiences and thought provoking re-enactments to demonstrate techniques that can keep women from becoming victims of crime. Hosted by actress Mariette Hartley, this video offers women timely information, and some self-defense techniques. Stimulating commentary by professionals and women who have survived violations demonstrate what actions might have been taken to prevent each assault. This program was produced by an internationally known private investigator that specializes in violent offenses.

Crown Prince

38 minutes

Dealing with some uncomfortable issues, this story looks at the problem of family violence from the perspective of the children- demonstrating the

tendency of children to copy the abusive behavior witnessed at home and exploring the difficult choices that must be made to bring an end to the cycle of violence.

Cut It Out

Salons against domestic abuse fund training video.

D.A.R.E. To Be Aware: Steve's Story

10 minutes, 1993

This video for junior high school and high school age children is about an eighteen year old girl who has a few friends over while her parents are out of town. Some of the guys come over with beer and this was not part of Rachael's plan. Her boyfriend, Steve, ends up getting drunk, corners Rachael, and makes unwanted advances towards her. Steve does not appreciate her turning him down, so he storms out of the house causing Rachael to be traumatized by the whole thing.

Dangerous Games: Power and Control in Teen Dating Relationships

30 minutes

Dangerous Games shows teens how dating violence occurs, allows them to engage in meaningful discussion about the issues, helps them recognize and understand subtle, and not so subtle, abusive and controlling behaviors, and encourages them to develop trusting and respectful relationships.

Date Rape: A Question of Trust

25 minutes, 1995

This video contains poignant interviews of rape victims who share their stories of date rape and sexual assault. It contains a group of teens that discuss how lack of communication and mixed messages can lead to confusion and misunderstanding. This program is an excellent catalyst for discussion of sexual assault, date rape, societal roles, expectations, and personal safety.

Dating in the Hood

22 minutes

This video contains interviews with people living in inner cities that talk about domestic violence. Domestic violence: physical, emotional and verbal abuse are defined and discussed, as is violence between inner city youth.

Dating Violence: The Hidden Secret

25 minutes, 1993

This video was designed to help teachers and parents working with adolescents recognize the problem of violence and abuse in teen relationships. It instructs on abuse and provides support and skills that could be used to end an unhealthy relationship. The video also informs viewers on what constitutes a healthy relationship. It could be used to change the attitude that violence is an acceptable way to solve problems or resolve conflict.

Dating Violence Love's Not Supposed to Hurt

Decade of AIDS

25 minutes, 1996

Through the testimonies of an HIV-infected young lady and an AIDS-infected young man, this video presents the facts, consequences, and life-changes of AIDS. Music celebrities appear and walk through the social and medical history of AIDS. This film targets teenagers and offers information on the prevention, testing and treatment of AIDS.

Defendiendo Nuestras Vidas (Spanish Version)

31 minutes

These videos conduct a series of interviews with women who are in prison for killing their abusers. They discuss the abuse they endured, what set them off to fight back, and what the system put them through. It also takes an overall look at domestic violence. It has a resource guide for the English version to lead in discussion about the issues of a community dealing with domestic violence.

Defendiendo Nuestras Vidas (Spanish Version)

31 minutes

Estos videos dirigen entrevistas con mujeres encarceladas por sus esposos abusadores. Hablan a cerca de sufrir el abuso y lo que "el sistema" las hacen soportar. El video echa un vistazo a la violencia domestica en general.

Dinosaur Junction: The Fight

10 minutes, 1993

This is a video for children about two kids, Stoney and Bronto, who collide with each other. What starts out as an accident turns into a big fight. They start calling each other names. They talk to a trusted adult about their situation and the problem is resolved. This is a good video for elementary school age children to watch to get a good example of how to resolve a conflict.

Dolores

50 minutes

Domestic Assault- The Law Enforcement Response

24 minutes

This video gives seven case scenarios of officers investigating domestic violence calls.

Domestic Disturbances: Officer Safety and Calming Techniques

25 minutes

This program dramatizes a “typical” quarrel incident and outlines procedures for police intervention and resolution. It shows tactics that can work successfully in this often dangerous and unpredictable situation. The video emphasizes careful approach, surveying for weapons or potential weapons, physical and visual separation of disputants, distraction and calming techniques and more.

Domestic Violence and Young Adults (also in Spanish)

23 minutes, 1994

This program looks at the components of dating violence, from physical attacks to mental and emotional abuse. Warning signs to look for in an abuser are explored, and suggestions for the viewers on how to protect themselves are provided. Also examined are key causes of youth dating violence, from pervasive media messages to behavior patterns that were inflicted on the abuser at home. Regardless of the cause, the tape

emphasizes that violence is a learned behavior that can be unlearned and changed.

Domestic Violence Screening for Health Care Professionals: Three Scenarios

Donna Edwards on CNN

This is a taped program.

Dr. Suess's: The Lorax

30 minutes

Dr. Suess's story of the Lorax who speaks for the trees and tries to stop their wholesale destruction.

Dress for Death

13 minutes, 1994

This video assists parents in recognizing warning signs that potentially indicate a child's membership or association with a gang. While clothing most definitely identifies a gang member, some youths dress in gang-fashion only for the sake of popular style. The video also lists other gang-related warning signs and offers parental tips on dealing with gang issues.

Elder Abuse: Five Case Studies

40 minutes

This film explores the issues of elder abuse very personally from the points of view of five different victims. It gives insight into the ambivalent feelings of abused individuals as they try to find a resolution to their pain.

Elder Physical & Sexual Abuse: The Medical Piece

(2-volume set).

Produced by IMO Productions, Inc. & U.S. Dept. of Justice.

Recognizing dementia, delirium, and depression can be essential to the assessment of suspected elder abuse. In Part 1, nationally recognized medical, prosecution, and social service experts describe medical signs & symptoms of elder physical and sexual abuse in detail and address how to best collect and document evidence for use in investigations. In Part 2, national experts offer clues in discovering elder abuse, and discuss interviewing considerations, multi-disciplinary approaches, and prosecution strategies.

Norm Nickle who is a well-known speaker on domestic violence hosts this series of four tapes. These tapes are designed for any professional who works with the issues of any kind of abuse. The videos show Nickle's treatment methods to end all forms of abuse. (A Workshop for Therapists, Advocates, Helping Professionals and Domestic Violence Counselors; The Truth About Domestic Violence: Dynamics of Abuse; Choosing to End the Violence.)

Escape the Abuse: Leaving Smart (cc)

21 minutes

This video has a series of interviews with people working in domestic violence associations. It tells the battered woman a plan to get out of her dangerous situation, and explains to her how to get help and regain hope after she has left a violent, abusive relationship. It also touches on legal ways to get an offender out of her life for good.

Ethnic Notions: Black People in White Minds

57 minutes, 1987

This is an award-winning documentary that takes viewers on a disturbing voyage through American history. It traces anti-black prejudice and deeply rooted stereotypes. The narration is by Ester Rolte with commentary by respected scholars. This film sheds light on the origins and devastating consequences of the last 150 years of bigotry.

Eye on Illinois With State Representative Louis Lang

29 minutes

Representative Louis Lang interviews ICADV executive director Vickie Smith regarding domestic violence in Illinois, the ICADV and its mission. She stresses the need for society to act against domestic violence, not just depending on law enforcement and social workers to prevent and remedy problems. She praises the Illinois legislature for its progress in domestic violence laws but she emphasizes the need to continue the fight.

Facing Diversity: Responding to Violence Against Women from Diverse Cultures

43 minutes

Facing Diversity helps to raise awareness of the issues and barriers faced by women from diverse cultures as they deal with the domestic violence in their lives. It illustrates specific, culturally-sensitive practices for police, prosecutors, and victim advocates in order to support and assist women to end the violence. Examples from Hispanic, East Asian and South Asian cultures are shown as women learn to obtain relief from violence, deal with the reality of their situation and navigate the justice and court systems.

Family Violence in America, Part 5, Horror and the Healing

33 minutes

Various true stories of acts of violence, therapies and recoveries are documented, including that of Tamara, fatally shot by her husband in the presence of her 4 year old child; and Denise, who lingers. This program shows that she had already left her husband twice and was pregnant with her second child when her husband shot her in the head before killing himself. An ever-escalating cycle of fear continues as the abuser vows “never again” and then loses control. For the children in such situations, trauma is the only legacy. Recovering victims reveal how their affirmations, mediations, and support groups enable them to learn that they do not need to tolerate abuse, that they can “make it” on their own. Healing often begins when they seek help.

Family Violence: An Intervention and Training Model for Dental Professionals

This video features vignettes of dental office protocol for working with victims/survivors of family violence as well as the challenges of dealing with abusive individuals in the office setting. Dentists and dental staff will learn how to address violence issues and gain insights on providing an office that is a safe place for victims.

Family Violence: Clinical Implications

This video was created to assist the dental professional to observe injuries to the head and neck that are the result of family violence. Dentists and allied dental team members will learn how to evaluate the differences between accidental injuries and intentionally inflicted injuries.

Family Violence: Private Business, Public Price (also in Spanish)

29 minutes

Domestic violence involves parties who are related by blood, marriage or some other intimate relationship. Interviews with victims, therapists and police officials effectively illustrate the many aspects of domestic abuse. Victims discuss how and when their abuse started and describe different violent episodes. Medical professionals reveal the different ways batterers control their partners and the wide range of abusive behaviors. Police officials explain how they respond to 911 calls and how they attempt to help domestic violence victims. Some of the different topics covered in this program include: a basic description of a potential victim and abuser, the pattern of abuse, reasons for staying in an abusive relationship, the obstacles that can impede both victims and abusers from seeking help, and the Protection from Abuse Act which provides an alternative to arrest and criminal prosecution.

Fast Forward: An Alcoholics Story

32 minutes. 1995

Alex, a teenage boy, has a bright future. He is a top athlete, has a pretty girlfriend, and plans to go to college. Alex also likes to drink beer. One night a person appears to him in his car. This person turns out to be Alex in the future. He is there to show Alex the consequences drinking will have in his future. Upon Alex's return to the present, he is scared sober and turns his life around.

Fighting Fair: Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. for Kids

A taped Geraldo episode with Mike Tyson and Robin Givens

Goin' to Chicago

1 hour, 9 minutes.

Government's Liability and Failure to Respond to Domestic Violence and Child Abuse

2 Hours

The Arizona Coalition Against Domestic Violence and legal organizations in that state co-sponsored an all day seminar in June 1990. The following tapes from the conference are available: Civil Rights Cases and Constitutional Theories; State's Lack of Duty to Battered Children; and Damage Actions Against Government Offices.

Grandparents: Enriching Lives

30 minutes, 2001

Hosted by Maya Angelou. This video focuses on the important grandparent, parent and child relationship. Highlights the profound effects grandparents can have on the lives of their grandchildren. Provides ideas for staying connected even when far away. Illustrates various grandparenting roles. Offers practical suggestions and inspiration that will benefit the entire family.

Gum In My Hair

20 minutes

This video looks at what bullying is, its effects on people and how it makes them feel. Bullying can have a lasting effect on a child as noted by psychologist, Dave Scratchley, Ph.D. who is featured in the program. Ideal for Grades 4-8

Health Care: How to Ask, What to Say

Heart On a Chain

17 minutes

This video is about teen dating violence. It has dramatizations, discussion among peers and positive alternatives teens may want to use instead of violence in a relationship.

Helping the Sexually Abused Child to Recover

1 Hour 18 Minutes

Dr. Wayne Duehn speaks to childcare workers, social workers, adoptive and foster parents, and other child care professionals about how child abuse protection and prevention is all in sex education. He discusses effective ways to educate children about sexuality and he offers alternative ways to help an abused child recover other than traditional therapy.

Hidden Feelings

15 minutes

From the Central Alberta Women's Emergency Shelter in Canada, this video uses a dramatization of a child witness of domestic violence. It is intended as a visual tool to help encourage and promote discussion among children.

Hidden Victims: Children of Domestic Violence (School Version)

30 minutes, 2000

This film profiles four families affected by domestic violence and reveals the impact it has on children.

Hostages at Home (cc)

52 minutes

This is a study of five women, all from different backgrounds. It allows the viewers to stop between each case for discussion. The video includes an insightful discussion worksheet. The five cases are current with the times and offer information regarding domestic violence.

How Difficult Can This be

70 minutes, 1989

This informative and entertaining film allows viewers to look at the world through the eyes of a learning child. Teachers, parents, psychologists and social workers participate in a series of classroom activities that cause frustration, anxiety and tension, all of which are what the child with a disability feels.

Hurtful Words

20 minutes, 1993

This film provides thoughtful media support for Health and Guidance, and Life Skills units on social skills, understanding feelings, critical thinking, behavioral choices and consequences, anger management, conflict resolution, stress management, self-esteem, culture/multiculturalism, and family life issues. It teaches children to stop and think about what they say before they say it.

Illinois' State Child Support Program

14 minutes.

Produced by The Center for the Support of Children.

Impact: Community Crisis Center's Approach to Abuser Treatment

22 minutes; 1992.

In Love and Danger

This video demonstrates some of the similarities and differences between adult domestic violence and teen dating violence. It gives warning signs of abusive relationships and gives parents or guardians suggestions on how to communicate with their children about dating violence.

It Ain't Love

57 minutes, 1998

This program follows the members of the young, spirited members of FACES, a gutsy improvisational theatre company based in New York City. They were given three months to create a show about abusive relationships. The teens reenact the violence that they've experienced or inflicted to educate about dating violence. Parental advisory is suggested.

It Never Hurts to Ask You May Save a Life: Screening, Assessment, and Management of Domestic Violence in the Primary Health Care Setting

20 minutes

It's Not Always Happy at My House

34 minutes

Produced by the Tri-State Children's Film Committee, this video helps children understand the violence in their lives. It shows how that violence affects them and their families. It also teaches them realistic and positive coping mechanisms.

It's Not My Fault: A Program About Conflict Resolution

18 minutes

This is a dramatization of a boy who learns how to solve problems, avoid fights and resolve conflicts with family, friends and others.

Its Not OK: Let's Talk About Domestic Violence

9 minutes

This video shows children that violence in the home is not okay. It demonstrates to children how to react if a violent situation would arise in their homes.

Judicial Review Hearings in Domestic Violence Cases

2004

This video illustrates the benefits of review hearings, the critical components of reviews, and the impact reviews have on the roles of system players. This film includes courtroom highlights of actual judicial review hearings and commentary from key personnel in three sites.

Juris Monitor Project

5 minutes

The Juris Monitor Project requires that stalkers and abusers wear an ankle monitor which informs victims and police when and offender gets too close to the victims and breaks a restraining order.

Kids Killing Kids/Kids Saving Kids (African American, Hispanic, and White Actors)

58 minutes, 1994

This is a unique dramatization of four different, but typical stories of today's youth. Employing an unusual technique, the program tells each story two ways. The first version shows what happens when a gun is involved, while the second version shows the outcome when there is no gun. It is a graphic demonstration of how potentially deadly conflicts can be resolved safely and peacefully. **Kids Saving Kids**, the documentary that follows **Kids Killing Kids**, shows how young people are reducing violence, resolving conflicts peacefully and maintaining gun-free schools. These efforts can serve as models for other schools across America.

Killing Us Softly III

This video compares how the advertising of women has changed from the first and second episodes of **Killing Us Softly** made in the late 1970's and 1980's. It demonstrates the powerful effect advertising had on the psyche of women and girls and how advertising defines the roles of men and women.

Language Choice Therapy: Building Cooperation in the Classroom & in Schools

81 minutes; 2003.

Produced by Shaw Dailey Creative Associates, Inc.-Designed to help teachers be more effective in the classroom by teaching new skills that not only reach the most difficult 5-8%, but benefit all students. Teaches a new approach to discipline, creating an opportunity for the student to learn in a climate of respect.

Leadership, Commitment and Change

28 Minutes

Legacy (with African American Actors)

25 minutes, 1994

Dee, Nathan, Tracey and Bruce face their pasts in this drama dealing with incest and corporal punishment. Through confrontation and reflection, each of the characters is forced to deal with his/her abuse and its effects. At the center of the story is Tracy, a teenager who struggles with ending a lifetime of parental abuse. She and her boyfriend, Bruce, himself a survivor, form a unified front – one generation pitted against another.

Looking Back Pushing Forward

Short Polaroid video about the history of the domestic violence movement.

Love Hurts

30 minutes, 1994

This video was originally an ABC after-school special. It tells the fictional story of the abusive relationship between two high school students. Christie is a straight “A” student and Michael is the star basketball player with poor academic achievements. Michael needs Christie more than she needs him. Christie cannot decide if she should stay with him or not. As Michael senses she is drifting from him, he becomes more controlling, manipulative and violent towards her. Christie blames herself for the abuse, but then realizes that she has choices and the abuse is not her fault.

Lovestruck

20 minutes

From the Domestic Violence Advocacy Program in Moline, Illinois, this video includes a manual on the reality of teen dating violence.

Making a Difference for the Recovering Child

1 Hour 33 Minutes

Dr. Wayne Duehn speaks to social workers, teachers, juvenile/criminal systems workers, adoptive and foster parents and other childcare professionals about how to properly approach a situation of child abuse. He also talks about the feelings sexually abused children experience and how these feelings should be handled. Also examined are the phases of healing needed in order for a person to recover from sexual abuse.

Making It Work: Teens Talk About Relationships

31 minutes

In a teen group setting, teens talk openly about the five main points in developing and maintaining healthy teen dating relationships. Included are: finding the right relationship, right ways to start a relationship, resolving relationship conflicts, avoiding dangerous relationships, and ending a relationship gracefully.

Mamma Stop

11 minutes

Produced by the Illinois Department of Alcoholism, this video deals with the issue of drinking during pregnancy.

Million Dollar Fundraisers

8 minutes

This is a short description of a fundraiser that uses the idea of selling golf balls to raise money.

No Matter Where You're Going: Domestic Violence PSA's

A series of public service announcements about domestic violence.

Not in This Family.

Produced by the Illinois Attorney General. Also includes facilitator's guide. A training video for mandated child abuse reporters. Topics include: recognizing child abuse & neglect; responding to the child; call the Hotline; choosing options other than calling the Hotline; and follow-up activities after calling the Hotline. Illustrates four scenarios for group discussion.

Off the Hook: A Guide to Telephone Privacy and Safety

17 minutes

This video is designed to assist battered women who have critical needs for telephone privacy. It discusses and demonstrates particular services available through phone companies, incorporates experiences of battered women, batterers, batterer's treatment programs and domestic violence programs and offers solutions for maintaining privacy and safety when placing or receiving telephone calls.

Officer Conflict: The Day Everything Went Wrong

22 minutes

This program focuses on three major causes of officer assaults: the officer's demeanor, his attitude and his lack of skill in using proven psychological

techniques to control the behavior of enraged disputants. The situations presented in the film give officers the opportunity to identify, analyze and openly discuss these factors.

Officer Survival: Hostile Individuals

22 minutes

This video provides officers with a series of proven psychological control techniques that will help restore order in inflamed or hostile situations – without resorting to use of physical force unless absolutely necessary. The techniques shown in this program include separation patterns, venting and distraction method.

One Fine Day

5 minutes

This uplifting film celebrates the American woman of the past and the present.

One Last Fight: Exposing the Shame

Documentary that explores and exposes the destructive impact the practice of dog fighting has on animal, people, and the entire community.

Ordinary People

280 minutes

This film is a dramatization based on case studies of families under everyday stresses and whose parents are abusing their children. Its purpose is to provoke discussion of potentially abusive families, including the dynamics, identification, and methods of intervention.

Over the Influence: Preventing Kids From Using Alcohol and Other Drugs

24 minutes, 1991

This documentary introduces practical solutions to drug and alcohol use among kids. It shows the results of a nationwide search to discover the best programs, techniques, and approaches that are successful in keeping kids drug/alcohol-free. The five programs featured differ in approach and method, but all show the victories in substance abuse prevention. This video would be effective for junior high age school children through adults.

Patterns of Abuse: Exploding the Cycle

23 minutes; 1999.

A film by Erik Friedl. Produced by the Anti-Cruelty Society.

A film that explores and identifies abuse of humans and animals in all its forms. Topics include the cycle of violence; the link between animal abuse and human cruelty; why some people become abusers; and what the viewer can do about this. It emphasizes intervention, along with practical ideas and solutions, at the earliest possible stage of the cycle.

People vs. James: Child Sexual Assault and the Jury

1996

A mock trial training video for prosecutors, law enforcement personnel and child advocates.

P.O.W. Prisoners of Wedlock

32 minutes

Hosted by Farrah Fawcett, this video shows the strong reality and gives practical advice to women who say that it could never happen to them. Abused women who have killed their abusers and women who have left abusive relationships to save themselves and their children are interviewed

Polaroid Domestic Violence Response Video: Take the Pictures. Tell the Story. Break the Cycle

9 minutes, 1997

This video explains the importance of taking photographs of domestic violence victims to law enforcement. It provides demonstrations of the types of photographs taken and interviews domestic violence victims and police officers.

Preventing Sexual Abuse

1 Hour and 50 Minutes

Dr. Teresa Fliger speaks to social workers, childcare workers, adoptive and foster parents, teachers and other child care professionals about how to deal with child sexual abuse situations. She discusses myths society has about child abuse. She explains specific strategies for dealing with a sexually abused child. She also talks about how to educate a child about sexuality and how to deal with the disclosure of sexual abuse.

Private Violence, Public Crisis (cc)

17 minutes

Through the point of view of a recovering woman batterer, this video presents a well-respected man outside of the home that becomes a violent,

controlling sexist inside the home. Narrator Louis Gossett Jr. highlights centers for men like this production's character, who acts violently against women. A common factor in the background of woman abuse is childhood abuse.

Prostitution: A Matter of Violence Against Women

52 minutes

This is the only audio-visual program of its kind – this documentary style film juxtaposes mainstream media depictions that glamorize prostitution with interviews from women who have survived commercial sexual exploitation. The video presents an analysis of prostitution as a form of violence against women that is facilitated and maintained through tactics of power and control – much the same as domestic violence.

Rachael and Marla

24 minutes

A story of two young friends, one is being abused. This film deals with the ideas of good and bad secrets, friendship and trust.

Real Men Don't Bleed

20 minutes

A Teenage boy living in an inner-city neighborhood grows into manhood and faces many pressures. This film illustrates situations faced by youths everyday and provides alternatives to the macho behavioral code that many young men feel constrained to practice. This video is not just for inner-city teens. It can benefit every boy in high school to help with any challenge.

Reporting Child Abuse: A Personal Responsibility

28 minutes, 1995

This is a program designed to train educators, health, and public health professionals about reporting child abuse. Child abuse reporting laws are explained and it also defines who are mandated reporters and their responsibilities as well as identifying these people.

Respecting Each Other: Sexual Harassment

18 minutes, 1995

This video, geared toward young adolescents, addresses “gender teasing,” or sexual harassment. Flipping skirts, writing foul notes, drawing dirty pictures, or inappropriately touching someone may seem like harmless jokes, but these go against the law and school policy. Students learn that picking

on peers isn't a good idea because it hurts their feelings. This video discusses pressure and the difference between "tattling" and "telling."

Responding to Ritualistic Abuse

Part I 1 Hour 5 Minutes

Part II 1 Hour 1 Minute

Judge William Laswell speaks to childcare professionals about ritual abuse. In his presentation, he shows a video on an organization that ritually abused the children who attended their establishment. This video interviews some of the children involved in the abuse and their parents. The children describe what happened to them and the parents tell what actions they attempted. A few adult survivors of ritual abuse are interviewed. Laswell also discusses general practices of satanic ritual abusers and actions taken for one particular case.

Risky Situations: The Reality of Rape

34 minutes, 2000.

A radio talk show features calls from teens who tell of their own experiences and thoughts about sexual coercion and date rape. Situations that may lead to date rape are detailed, including isolation, intoxication, gender power, and social indebtedness. Strategies to avoid risky situations and to discourage coercion by potential offenders are shown.

Rule of Thumb

30 minutes, 1989

This video discusses the procedure for obtaining orders of protection in Missouri, but also includes interviews with victims and abusers. A former batterer, who now works with other abusers, speaks of the necessity for men to take responsibility for their violent actions. Especially effective are the segments in which women openly discuss their feelings about their experience of being battered.

Safe: Inside a Battered Women's Shelter

49 minutes, 2000

This film follows three women through their stay in an inner city shelter. They tell their stories, live their lives and talk about how being in shelter makes them feel. This film is narrated by Susan Sarandon and is an excellent film that shows a sample of what everyday shelter life is like for a battered woman.

Satanic Ritual Abuse: Child Victims

Part I 1 Hour 16 Minutes

Part II 1 Hour 1 Minute

Dr. Catherine Gould speaks at the conference, “Kids, Cults and Gangs,” and addresses educators, childcare workers and parents about the feelings children can experience after being abused by a person or people in a cult. She discusses many of the symptoms to look for and behaviors that indicate ritualistic abuse. She also touches on approaches of therapy for victims of ritualistic abuse. Also discussed are possible reasons for multiple personalities in survivors of ritual abuse.

Screen to End Abuse: A Practical Approach to Addressing Domestic Violence in Primary Care Settings

2003

Screen to End Abuse includes five clinical vignettes demonstrating techniques for screening and responding to domestic violence in primary care settings.

Signs and Symptoms of Ritual Abuse

Part I 1 Hour 9 Minutes

Part II 1 Hour 31 Minutes

Dr. Catherine Gould talks at the youth conference, “Kids, Cults and Gangs,” to parents, social workers, teachers, adoptive and foster parents, and other childcare professionals about what ritual abuse is, the differences in signs of ritual abuse and other forms of abuse in children and recovering adults. She talks about how to assess a child who is being ritually abused. Also addressed is the severity of the control a cult has over a child and the ways a cult keeps that control. Gould discusses the signs, fears and consequences that result from ritual abuse.

Single Parents and Their Children

20 minutes

This series of short dramatizations about various problems single parents face with their children would be ideal to start discussion in a single parent support group on how to solve these problems effectively with their children.

Small Justice: Little Justice in America's Family Courts

56 minutes

This program explores the family court system which routinely takes children away from the protective parent and puts them in the care of the person the children have named as their abuser. It describes how fathers use and sacrifice their children in order to control and punish the mothers, and how the courts, often unwittingly, help those men. By following the stories of three dedicated women and their lawyers the program exposes a systematic legal failure to protect those who need protection the most. A Video By Garland Waller

Sooper Puppy Series

15-20 minutes

With the use of puppets and animation, these videos dramatize the effects of low self-esteem, life's choices, and other things children encounter in a way that children can understand. Included are: Whose Wazzit?; Once Upon a Feeling; What's the Difference?; A Friend In Need; Drink, Drank, Drunk; Flying High; Puff of Smoke; Words Can Hurt.

Special Needs of the Sexually Abused Child

1 hour 32 minutes

Dr. Wayne Duehn speaks to parents, teachers, social workers, and other childcare professionals at the Whole Child conference. He discusses the sexual stereotypes society sends to children and the effects these messages have on children. He gives some ideas on how to communicate better messages about sexuality. Also discussed are some ways to talk about the sexual abuse with the children so as to help them have a better understanding of what has happened to them and to help them cope with the abuse.

Spiderman—Where You Can Go For Help

11 minutes

This video teaches children that by asking questions they can learn where to get help. The story line follows Spiderman's friends asking different people for help. This fully animated program includes a multi-cultural cast of characters.

Stalking: Real Fear, Real Crime Roll Call Tape

Stopping Violence Against Women Using New Federal Laws

1 Hour, 1996

This provides information on new federal laws to fight domestic violence. It has opening remarks with former U.S. Attorney General Janet Reno.

Street Gangs: A Way of Life

Part I 1 Hour 23 Minutes

Part II 52 Minutes

State trooper Larry Rowland speaks to childcare professionals about street gangs. He discusses reasons children join gangs and how the cycle starts. Rowland talks about the ways gang members communicate with each other through clothing and other signs. He also stresses to the childcare worker the importance of communication skills and what these skills are.

Surviving Domestic Violence: Jack O'Malley

23 minutes, 1996

Testimonies of four survivors of domestic violence illustrate the agonies of abusive relationships and the triumphs of escaping their abusers. Each woman's experience in seeking shelter, obtaining an order of protection, and pursuing happiness for herself and her children differs slightly, but their general story-lines communicate the cycle of abuse and the victory of freedom.

Survivors

20 minutes

Produced by the Philadelphia Coalition on Domestic Violence, this film is based on discussion with five formerly battered women who are different in age, career, race, and background. The video's primary purpose is to influence how individuals respond to battered women by increasing their understanding of the extent of physical abuse and the toll it takes on victims.

Synergy

3 minutes

An inspirational music video that proclaims the hope of “creating a future together.”

Take Back the Night

19 minutes, 1988

The Illinois Coalition Against Domestic Violence produced this film. It includes a dramatization of police response to a domestic violence call and actual interviews with members of the police force, a local shelter director, and the director of a batterer’s treatment program.

Talk to Me

20 minutes, 1988

This dramatization of three typical conflicts among adolescent students was produced by the Kansas Child Abuse Prevention Council, Inc. Several students, unsuccessful in using fighting, arguing and name calling to save conflicts end up in detention. A popular teacher offers the alternative of open, honest discussion and the students make surprising discoveries about themselves and conflict resolutions.

Teen Issues: Sexual Harassment

17 minutes, 1996

The focus of this program is to enlighten teen viewers about sexual harassment and educate them on how to stop it. It has interviews of teens who have been sexually harassed, therapists and people close to the victims.

Tell Em How You Feel (also in Spanish)

18 minutes

This film helps children look at conflict as a normal thing in life and shows them healthy ways to resolve conflict.

The 11th Commandment.

Produced by Scott Dean Management.

The Advertising Council Public Service Announcement for Domestic Violence Prevention

2 minutes

A series of public service announcements on domestic violence

The Dating Bill of Rights

26 minutes, 1998

This video is geared towards school children, grades 6-10. It is a video designed to teach young people about healthy dating relationships. It covers myths and facts about teen dating violence, how to recognize early warning signs of dangerous, unhealthy relationships, breaking up respectfully and what love is and isn't.

The Edge of Each Other's Battles: The Vision of Audre Lorde

1 hour, 2002

This video is about Audre Lorde's broad social vision and the translation of that vision into a historic transnational conference, which used her work, while celebrating her life.

The Last Taboo

30 minutes

This video is derived from portions of a workshop with six sexually abused women and six peer counselors. Each woman shares her abusive stories and begins to explore her distress with the facilitators. The facilitators enable the abuse victims to arrive at the realization that they have the power to go on with their lives in meaningful directions.

The Fall of Freddie the Leaf

16 minutes

This is a story of the life, death, and grieving from Leo Buscaglia. It helps children deal with the loss of a loved one by presenting death as a part of the cycle of life.

The Fear That Binds Us

This is a video about domestic violence that was made in the late 1970's. The quality is poor but might be useful for the historical aspect of it.

The Hot Head in the House

15 minutes

This investigative report examines spousal abuse in America and shows various ways some cities attempt to stop the violence. It discusses the factors aggravating the problem and the need for men to assume responsibility for their own actions. The video also interviews abusers, their families, and professionals who counsel them.

The Power of Choice (Series)

Michael Pritchard, probation officer for juveniles turned comedian, hosts facilitated discussions among teens about their problems, choices and consequences. This series includes nine videos, including The Power of Choice, 60 minutes long; the rest of the videos are 30 minutes each: Acting on Your Values; Self Esteem; Coping With Pressures; Drugs and Alcohol, Part I and II; Drinking and Driving; Sex; Friendship and Dating; Depression and Suicide; Communicating with Parents; and Raising Your Parents.

The Pro-Arrest Response To Domestic Violence

20 minutes

This video was developed for use in law enforcement training. It dramatizes a domestic violence incident using actual police officers and illustrates the establishment of probable cause and factors influencing arrest decisions.

The Savage Cycle: A Video on Domestic Violence

29 minutes

A spectrum of those involved with the issue of domestic violence, including police, shelter directors, former batterers, domestic violence victims and survivors, address the behaviors of abusers, the effects of emotional and psychological abuse, the stages of an abusive episode, and the effects of domestic violence on children.

The Savage Man

29 minutes

This is a program about domestic violence from the male perspective. Through interviews, men explain some of the causes for their violent behavior. It also contains interviews with abused women explaining how the abuse affects them.

The Strength to Resist: The Media's Impact on Women & Girls

33 minutes

A documentary about the image of women in advertising. The film presents the ideas of girls and young women as well as those of the leading authorities in the fields of psychology of women and girls, eating disorders, gender studies, violence against women, and media literacy--and focuses their ideas on practical solutions and the best tactics for reclaiming our culture.

The Violence Stops Here: State's Attorney Appellate Prosecutor

2000

The War at Home

11 minutes, 1994

Opening this film is an actual 911 emergency call from a young girl whose parents are in the middle of a domestic dispute. Through compelling interviews with those who have survived the "war at home," we learn more about the cycle of violence and the pain victims endure even after the abuse has ended.

Thumbs Up For Kids: Testifying in Court

13 minutes

This video, designed for children of the ages 3-8, explains court procedures and reduces the fear of testifying in court. Interacting with a small group of kids, Ruby Peterson-Unger defines such terms as witness, judge, and going to court. She identifies key members of the court and stresses the importance of asking the judge about anything that is unclear. Children who have testified in court tell their experiences and assure viewers that they are safe in a courtroom and will feel good about telling the truth.

Til Death Do Us Part: The Domestic Violence Stalker

60 minutes, 2001

Police training about the Domestic Violence Stalker featuring Sgt. Anne O'Dell, Michael Lindsey, and Mark Wynn. Set of two training videotapes and a manual intended to present a basic blueprint for a better coordinate community response to stalking crimes and the subsequent investigations and prosecutions of those crimes.

To A Safer Place

58 minutes

This video is a true story about an adult survivor of abuse. She suffered sexual abuse through her childhood and is now coming back to her childhood home to confront her nightmare. This video would be good for any teen or adult survivor because it examines the myths about abuse and may help these survivors to see how they can recover from their abuse.

To Have and To Hold

21 minutes

This documentary examines the problem of wife abuse through the abuser's perspective. Men who have assaulted their wives and lovers are interviewed

to explore the personal and societal attitudes, which lead them to abuse their wives or lovers. This video addresses why men beat their wives, how common woman abuse is, at what point batterers seek help and whether this help can really change them. This video would be helpful for a number of audiences working with the problem of wife abuse, including: workers in a woman's shelter, health care workers, police, and legal service workers. It may also stimulate high school and college classroom discussions.

To Save a Life: Ending Domestic Violence in Jewish Families

35 minutes

This video deals with the issues faced by abused Jewish women. It explores all of the aspects of domestic violence and information on getting help with a Jewish perspective.

Tough Guise

80 minutes, 1999.

This video is geared towards college and high school students to systematically examine the relationship between images of popular culture and the social construction of masculine identities in the U.S. at the dawn of the 21st century. Jackson Katz argues that the widespread violence in American society needs to be understood as part of an ongoing crisis in masculinity.

Toxic Relationships

29 minutes.

Healthy relationships between partners are based on mutual trust, respect and affection. The flip side of a healthy relationship is a toxic one- build on a shaky foundation of mistrust, jealousy, and disrespect. In this thought-provoking video, high school students discuss the obsessive demands, the blaming, and control issues common to abusive relationships. The teens encourage peers to avoid abusive situations and to look for trust and acceptance from their friends and partners.

Two Million Women

29 minutes

This video reveals the uncomfortable truths behind the battering of women. In-depth interviews with the women who stay and the men who abuse show there are reasons for both of these behaviors.

Ubicate Haz La Diferencia

V.I.N.E.: America's Most Wanted.

Public Service Announcement produced by NBC Studios.

Veronica's Story

5 minutes

In this video a girl named Veronica begins her story as a happy girl with big dreams about the future. Veronica begins to get into trouble as problems start at home, she shares her story of how she was sexually abused by her mother's boyfriend and neglected by her mother.

Violence in the Home: Living in Fear

30 minutes, 1989

This film begins with a realistic dramatization of a domestic violence incident and continues with interviews among victims and abusers. Narrated by Barbara Bosson and Felton Perry of "Hill Street Blues," the film offers facts and statistics, along with the reactions of men and women who have been involved in domestic violence incidents. Effects of physical, psychological and emotional abuse are candidly discussed. The abusers who appear in this video are participants in California's mandatory counseling for perpetrators. It gives a view of how California's legal system responds to domestic violence, but has applications for other states as well.

Violencia Familiar: Una Perspectiva Masculina

Watch What You Drink

15 minutes, 1996

This program reports facts on the sinister use of the drug rohypnol, also known as the "date rape drug." It has interviews with women who believe they were victims of the drug were sexually assaulted.

What Ramon Did (Also in Spanish)

30 minutes

Ramon is an intravenous drug user who is returning from jail to his neighborhood. All of his friends and neighbors are afraid that he may be a carrier of the AIDS virus because they know that Ramon shared his needles with other drug users. This video also contains some hard-hitting testimony from former Surgeon General C. Everett Koop.

What Should I Do: The Fight

8 minutes

From Disney Production, this video dramatizes a fight between two boys. It shows how to handle a situation so that a fight may be avoided.

What's Wrong With This Picture? A Program About-Self Esteem

19 minutes

Enraged over his girlfriend's resistance to his sexual advances, Max opens a beer, drinks it, and speeds down a deserted road. He winds up at the police station and his drunk, irate father has to come get him. Max has difficulties in school. He and his friends concoct cruel games to play when they get drunk. After seeing his school counselor, Max understands he must do something to break the negative cycle his dad has begun. If he doesn't, this negative cycle will go on forever.

When A Woman Fights Back

38 minutes

Women who kill in self-defense raise many legal and social questions. This film examines the murder trial of Yvonne Wanrow, which set a legal precedent when the Washington State Supreme Court reversed her murder conviction. The ethical and legal issues raised in the discussion include the concept of "reasonable force" and legal standards between men and women; the difference in how men and women perceive threatening situations; and an inherent bias in the wording of instructions to a jury. The film then examines how precedents were subsequently applied in three other murder trials.

When Domestic Violence Comes To Work

A video for employee supervisors and managers

When I Feel Alone

15 minutes, 1995

Everyone faces loneliness. This video shows school-age children ways to combat loneliness by reading their emotions and listening to painful feelings. It also addresses making decisions regarding gangs, alcohol, drugs, and other abusive behaviors.

When I Get Mad

20 minutes

This film teaches children to deal with their anger.

When Injuries Speak, Who Will Listen? A Healthcare Response to Domestic Violence

32 minutes, 2004.

A video for healthcare professionals about the challenges faced by medical personnel, and the solutions available to them when responding to domestic violence. Featuring internationally-known, Dr. Jacquelyn Campbell, Anna D. Wolfe, Chair & Associate Dean for Faculty Affairs at Johns Hopkins University School of Nursing, and staff from the University, the program shows their assessment strategies and protocols when dealing with domestic violence survivors. It discusses patterns and the health impact of abuse, issues of immediate safety, dealing with the batterer in the health care setting, and providing support and services to survivors.

Wings Like a Dove: Healing for the Abused Christian Woman

34 minutes

This video covers the Christian religious issues related to domestic violence and provides information on getting help. It is designed for use in shelters, churches, fellowships and other places where women meet. A study guide for facilitators accompanies it.

Women Seen on Television

This creative flick consists of women, taped over a two-day period. The seductive, weak and helpless images of women imply that women are incapable of making decisions. The associations with pleasure make the television woman into a sex object; viewers also often find her shopping, cooking or cleaning.

Working It Out At Madison

30 minutes each

This is a teen guidance series that provides real life solutions to personal and social conflicts. Set in Madison High, an ensemble of talented young actors brings to life problems and challenges experienced by young people everywhere. Available are The Boy Wonder-Children of Alcoholics; Not Just Anybody-Dating Pressure and Violence; and Breaking the Chain-Building Healthy Relationships.

Working With Victimization

40 minutes.

!Ya No Mas!

27 minutes

Yes You Can Choose

28 minutes

Michael Prichart speaks to school age children. Kids discuss choices and consequences. Titles include Dealing With Feelings; Saying No (to smoking); Being Responsible; and Cooperation.

Yes You Can Say No

20 minutes

This film tells the story of one boy's success in stopping his own victimization. The assertiveness skills that are the subject of this highly acclaimed film have been identified by offenders and therapists as critical in reducing a child's vulnerability to assault.

You're Hurting Me, Too

24 minutes

This video examines both the short-term and long-term effects of domestic violence on children. Studies have shown that even if a child is not physically abused, witnessing the violence not only scars the child emotionally, but leads to behavior that as an adult, mimics what they learned from their parents. The video stresses the importance of providing children with counseling, getting them out of the violent home and giving children a positive message about dealing with anger. It is a valuable resource for advocacy groups, education programs, counselors and any other organization concerned with domestic violence or the welfare of children.

Your Voice, Your View—Get Reel About Rape

Contest is intended to engage and instruct youth on several levels, and most importantly taking an active role in preventing sexual violence.

DVD's

A Life Without Fear

27 minutes

This educational docudrama is one of the first programs to explore domestic violence specifically in the South Asian context. A fictionalized account raises the many challenges faced by immigrant survivors. This program video effectively opens discussion for all kinds of audiences, and ends with survivor testimonies.

Code of Silence: Officer-Involved Domestic Violence

17 minutes

This new program featuring Mark Wynn, twenty-year veteran of the Nashville Police Department, describes the trauma experienced by female partners of officers, and emphasizes the need to adopt model policies establishing procedures for handling domestic violence committed by law enforcement. Survivors, who are themselves police officers, tell their powerful stories of being abused and their reluctance to talk about it. One survivor only realized she was being abused when she attended domestic violence seminars as part of her law enforcement training, and another describes being in full uniform with a squad car parked outside her home, and then being chased in her neighborhood by her ex-husband, also a police officer.

Hostages at Home

52 minutes

This is a study of five women, all from different backgrounds. It allows the viewers to stop between each case for discussion. The video includes an insightful discussion worksheet. The five cases are current with the times and offer information regarding domestic violence.

Illinois Voices

28 minutes, 2006

The voices of more than 20 persons with developmental disabilities speak about their lives and about changes they would like to see in the world. These self-advocates share lessons they have learned from their life

journeys. Gain insight into how they feel about their disabilities and about others attitudes towards them. Discover that all people, regardless of disability, share a common bond and have similar desires about what they want out of life.

Judicial Review Hearings in Domestic Violence Cases

2004

This video illustrates the benefits of review hearings, the critical components of reviews, and the impact reviews have on the roles of system players. This film includes courtroom highlights of actual judicial review hearings and commentary from key personnel in three sites.

La Guerra En Casa (The War At Home,)

19 minutes

Program in Spanish with English subtitles that tells the powerful stories of domestic violence survivors from the Hispanic community. A victim advocate and batterer treatment therapist, as well as a former batterer, discuss domestic violence and ways to prevent it.

Responding to Victims of Human Trafficking: A Training Video for Victim Service Providers (CC)

20 minutes, 2008

This DVD addresses the need for the victim services field to work in partnership with providers of services to immigrants and other allied practitioners to better serve victims of human trafficking. It is targeted to traditional victim service providers with the aim of helping them expand their existing skills and resources to serve trafficking victims. A component of this DVD is a resources guide that, while not exhaustive, provides resources about what defines human trafficking and the response to this crime by the U.S. Government, the international community, and nongovernmental entities.

Safety First (also in Spanish)

13 minutes, 2006

Provides an overview of steps domestic violence survivors can take to keep themselves and their children safe. Protective orders- what they are and where and how to get them, safety planning, and documenting evidence and proof of abuse are described. Other topics include overcoming objections, the importance of confiding in a trusted friend, and planning ahead.

Protective orders and planning can be the best option for safety, and this new video helps provide needed information on these important tools.

Safety Planning With Children

32 minutes

Contains basic information for those children living in families where there is domestic violence. The program can help domestic violence shelter programs train new and current employees so they can develop the knowledge and skills necessary to create effective safety plans with children. The accompanying discussion guide provides additional information, including activities for use in shelter settings and a list of resources children's advocates have found helpful.

The Savage Cycle: A Video on Domestic Violence

29 minutes

A spectrum of those involved with the issue of domestic violence, including police, shelter directors, former batterers, domestic violence victims and survivors, address the behaviors of abusers, the effects of emotional and psychological abuse, the stages of an abusive episode, and the effects of domestic violence on children.
